



# Robb Ranch History, cont.

Almost as good as a horse

Mike, David's son, is a 1966 graduate of Lexington St. Ann's. After six years in the Navy he attended Hastings Central Community College to become an automotive technician. He married Jeanne Kral in 1981 and they moved to the ranch in 1985.

The ranch "newcomers" are Joe's daughter, Amy, and her husband, Scott Hill. They were married in 1991 and moved to the ranch in 1993. They live in the ranch headquarters in the home where Joe was born and reared.

Haying was an important operation on the Robb Ranch. In the early years, Bill kept 20 teams of mules to help with the labor intensive task of putting up hay.

One of the first big changes came when family members designed a truck to be used as a sweep by turning the steering column backwards.

As the next generation took over, the first hay balers were introduced. Joe recalls the operation used an old Oliver threader – a big, heavy thing someone sat on the back of and put wires through the threaders and needles.

Young ranch hands earned 50 cents for every wagonload of bales. One summer, a young Joe Jeffrey earned \$32.50 and thought he was a very wealthy young man.

Robb Island, now called Jeffrey Island, was an integral part of the operation. The east and west ends

of the island were used for summer pasture, while the center portion was prairie hay that was put up for winter feed. A crew of 10 or 12 men moved to the island every summer and lived there till the job was completed. There was no bridge to the island, just a trail across the more or less dry river bed.

With so many family members involved in the operation over the years, at one time there were six homes on the ranch, including one on the island, along with a large horse barn and several out-buildings.

But times change and earlier this year the family decided to lease Robb Island and some related land to Central Nebraska Public Power and Irrigation District for habitat for threatened and endangered species.

Farming and ranching will continue on a reduced scale on the Gosper County land, and notes Joe, there will still be some of those famous Black Angus to add some color to the countryside.

Extended family joining in the anniversary celebration are Joe's sisters, Jane Berreckman and Judy Kimball; Robb's sister, Kyle Seese; and Mike's sisters, Sue Rouse, Sarah Settles and Martha Jeffrey.

Whatever the future holds, the Robb name will endure through the precinct and cemetery, testimony to a lasting legacy created by Bill Robb, Platte Valley pioneer.



# In Concert: Michael Peterson

Michael Peterson is an artist driven with a desire to invite us all to laugh, dance and consider our own lives, often all simultaneously.

"I can't remember one moment in my life when music wasn't my friend, my favorite source of entertainment, my comfort and my encouragement," he says. "I have been consumed with writing and singing my entire life – long before I got paid for it and long before anyone except my Grandma listened."



Michael was born in Tucson, Ariz., and raised on the Columbia River in Eastern Washington. Between playing sports and hanging with his friends, he spent countless hours in front of a record player at his grandmother's house. Her huge record collection exposed Michael to the likes of Cole Porter, Harold Arlen, Hoagy Carmichael, Roger Miller, Jimmy Webb and Willie Nelson.

After high school Michael chose a football scholarship to Pacific Lutheran University over music for the first time in his life. During college he developed a relationship with quarterback Brad Westering, whose post-college success as a producer for Denise Williams gave Michael his first professional opportunity as a songwriter. His first three cuts came through that relationship and confirmed his lifelong belief that he could succeed as a commercial songwriter.

He began traveling to Nashville once a month for nearly two years to build working relationships with Music Row's songwriters. These efforts eventually evolved into Peterson's first album in 1996. Perhaps the best known song from that debut is the cut, "Drink, Swear, Steal & Lie." It delivers the kind of word twist that both surprises and delights at the same time.

Another Peterson favorite is a duet with Travis Tritt, "I Finally Passed the Bar." Michael recalls sitting on the tailgate of his pickup several years ago listening to Travis and dreaming that someday he would make a record like that. Not only did that first album become a reality, but a number of popular singles have peppered the airwaves the past three years. Among them "Somethin' 'Bout a Sunday," "By the Book," "From Here to Eternity," and "Loves Great."

Though he may sing and write like a seasoned veteran, one can't help but feel that these are only early chapters in an incredible story. Michael keeps his focus with one simple goal: "I just want to be the kind of man my dog thinks I am. He thinks I am great."

Wild horse handler Bryan Neubert of Alturas, Calif., is among the gifted few who have a special camaraderie with horses.

An expert in horse handling and colt starting, Neubert will demonstrate his techniques in gentling a wild horse from the Bureau of Land Management's Wild Horse and Burro Facility at Elm Creek.


Over a period of a couple of hours, Neubert will gain the horse's trust and eventually halter and lead it.

Neubert was raised on his family's ranch near Salinas, Calif. Growing up around horses and cattle, he cannot remember wanting to be anything but a cowboy. In his teens and 20s he had the op-


