



Since his first album, <u>Wild-Eyed Dreams</u>, came out in 1986, Ricky Van Shelton has sold more than 10 million albums. In 1996, alone, without the benefit of a new record, he sold nearly a quarter-million albums.




Jerry Diaz, a fourth-generation charro, will demonstrate the skills and courage of being a Mexican horseman.

The One Arm Bandit & Company




ver 100 years of ranching and still going strong. The Historical Haythorn Ranch is much the same today as it was over a century ago as a dream in the mind of a young stowaway.

In 1876, a young man named Haythornthwaite Lancaster, England, fell hopelessly in love with a girl. Both being sixteen, their parents considered them still too young and forbade their plans to marry. Young Harry was heartbroken. Soon after, he was discovered as a stowaway on a ship headed for America. The captain put him to work caring for some Hereford bulls being shipped to Texas. No stranger to livestock, or hard work, Harry's ability impressed the captain and upon arrival, he was dispatched to accompany the bulls to their destination.

Over the next eight years he worked as a cowhand, making four trail drives north out of Texas. Two of the drives went to Kansas and two to Ogallala, Nebr.

On his last drive to Ogallala, with only his savings and what he could carry on a horse, Harry decided to strike out on his own. He bought a livery stable, shortened his name to Haythorn and married Emma Gilpin of Arthur County.

After just a couple years, the newlyweds sold the livery barn and Harry went to work as a wagon boss for P.A. Yeast. He took his wages in cattle and Emma cooked at the Yeast Ranch (25 cents a meal if there were more than 10




men at the table-less than that, she cooked for free). Nearly every penny they could pinch was put aside to buy land. Harry then went to work for the Triangle Ranch 16 miles away. He rode back and forth on the weekends and left Emma to care for their holdings and cattle.

Emma would ride sidesaddle to the Ogallala general store 40 miles away, leading a packhorse for supplies. Known as a crack shot with a rifle, she often added a prairie chicken to the table.

In 1884 Harry and Emma filed on a land grant section four miles west of Arthur, and an American ranching dynasty was born.

Harry and Emma had two sons,

Walt Percival and Harry Walker Haythorn. Though different in disposition and ability, both boys were accomplished "cowboys" and continued on in the ranching tradition.

Today, Haythorn Land & Cattle Company is spread out over 90,000 acres of deeded and leased land, on four ranches in three Nebraska counties. Waldo Haythorn (grandson of Harry Haythornthwaite), the present day patriarch of the family, and his wife, Beldora, have managed to keep the family firmly established in the Nebraska Sandhills through blizzards, low cattle prices and high taxes. Waldo watches proudly today as his son, Craig, continues preserving the Haythorn dream as present day manager of the ranch.

Horses have played a pivotal role in the ranch's survival ever since Harry loaded his saddle on a train and headed for Baker, Oregon, where he gathered up 500 head trailed them back Since Nebraska. then, Haythorn name has been synonymous with good, working ranch horses. The Haythorn Ranch was the first Nebraska ranch to register quarter horses, and today is the largest breeder of the American Quarter Horse in America, and third largest in the world.

In addition to the Quarter Horses, the Haythorns use Belgian and Percheron draft horses. The 6-horse hitches pull the feed wagons in the winter and stack over 6,000 tons of hay in the summer. Craig Haythorn says horses are cheaper to operate and, "You don't have to put gas in a horse or change his oil, and they're never too cold to start."

The day to day life is much the same for the Haythorn cowboys today as it was over a century ago. The family has taken great pride in preserving the rich heritage and tradition of its founding father. Whether they're tending cattle, fixin' fence, feeding with a team, roping and draggin calves to the branding fire, or riding into camp and the chuckwagon at day's end, the Haythorn cowboys are proud to ride for the brand. These rolling Nebraska Sandhills will be "home" generations to Haythorns to come.

The Haythorn family is pleased to welcome all of you for a special day of entertainment...and we encourage you to enjoy Nebraska's Sandhills and one of our sunsets. We are honored to have been chosen to host the Nebraska Cattlemen's Ball 2000.

Our family too has experienced cancer and we hope the funds raised from this event will help find a cure for this dreaded disease.

We take our hats off to the many volunteers throughout the state who have worked to make this an enjoyable and fun-filled day for all. Our family especially appreciates the support of our local area volunteers and the financial support of all our quests.

A leader in cancer care and research for more than 30 years, the UNMC Eppley Cancer Center is a National Cancer Institute designated cancer center — a distinction held by only 59 centers in the country. Combining patient care, biomedical research and education programs for cancer patients, their families and the public, we are both nationally and internationally recognized. In fact, people from all 50 states and 19 foreign countries have come to our cancer center in search of treatment and hope.

Last year's ball raised \$140,000 for cancer research at the UNMC Eppley Cancer Center. After careful consideration, Dr. Kenneth H. Cowan

director, UNMC Eppley Cancer Center, selected Dr. Joyce Solheim, Dr. David Berkowitz and Dr. Wing-Chung Chan to receive last year's "Cattlemen's Cancer Research Grant."

"The funding from the Cattlemen's Ball is a significant resource in our fight against cancer at the UNMC Eppley Cancer Center," said Dr. Cowan. "We are proud and priviledged to be associated with such fine people and a wonderful event."

"I look forward to this and future Cattlemen's Balls, as we work toward one common goal, to unlock the mysteries of cancer," Cowan continued.

On behalf of all the members of my laboratory staff, I would like to express thanks for the generous support of our research that has been provided by proceeds from the Nebraska Cattlemen's Ball. These funds have allowed us to investigate a possible reason for the inability of the immune system in some people to control the spread of cancer. Specifically, we have begun to examine how the assembly of a particular type of immune system protein (called the HLA protein) differs among people, and how those differences may affect the ability to defend against particular types of cancer. By understanding the basis of natural differences in cancer susceptibility, we will create a foundation for the development of better means of preventing and curing cancer.

My laboratory staff and I would like to thank the Nebraska Cattlemen's Association for their support of our research on non-Hodgkin's lymphoma. We are investigating the genetic alterations that are important in determining the clinical behavior of a lymphoma. We approach this problem by examining the genetic abnormalities and the gene expression patterns of a large series of lymphoma using the recently developed DNA-microarray technology. Genetic abnormalities that are associated with a poor prognosis or resistance to treatment will be identified. This study will lead to a better understanding of the genetic events governing the behavior of a tumor. Our long term goal is to design a diagnostic test that will tell us not only the type of tumor the patient has, but also how that tumor is going to act, so that treatment can be customized to produce the maximum benefit. The improved understanding of the genetic basis of lymphoma will also provide opportunities for the development of new treatments for this disease.

My coworkers and I would like to express our sincere thanks to the Nebraska Cattlemen's Association for their support of our research. With the NCA funds, we are performing studies on new types of strategies for developing chemotherapeutic drugs. Our laboratory is particularly interested in enzymes that catalyze the decarboxylation of amino acids (AADC's). Two enzymes of this class, L-ornithine decarboxylase and SAM decarboxylase control the formation of polyamines, important regulatory molecules that are expressed at higher levels in cancer cells than in normal cells. Effective inhibitors of these enzymes have potential as novel chemotherapeutic agents. For example, one such compound, DFMO (alpha-difluoromethylornithine) is already in clinical trials for the prevention of colon cancer. In early work with the NCA funds, we have designed, synthesized and performed the first, in vitro, feasibility studies on a new, "dual warhead" triggering system to be used for the mechanism-based inhibition of enzymes such as these. Such dual triggers have never before been used for AADC inhibition. Fundamental studies of this nature are required if new drugs are to be developed. This exploratory research has only been possible through the generous funding of this pilot project by the NCA.
